Welcome, Guests and Visitors

- St. Philip's Church is one of 127 congregations in the Episcopal Diocese of Chicago, and our identity, vision and mission extend far beyond through the worldwide Anglican Communion. Our members' faith stories are diverse: some are lifelong Episcopalians, while others are converts from other traditions. We hope for an opportunity to know you, your story and your questions.
- Our normal Sunday worship is called the Eucharist, taken from the ancient Greek word Eucharist – Thanksgiving! Our use of the Book of Common Prayer, a valued tradition dating from the English Reformation in the mid-16th century, can sometimes be daunting to guests or newcomers. Please feel free to ask us questions if and when you become confused and/or curious.

Rite 1 and Rite 2 Explanation

Thank you for choosing to worship with us today. If you are new to the Episcopal Church, you may notice some terms that are unfamiliar. We are occasionally asked, "What do you mean by 'Rite 1 and Rite 2?'" (Sometimes rendered as "Rite I & Rite II".)

Most of our Sunday services and all of our Tuesday worship times use "Rite 2". All this means is that contemporary language is employed by both the presider and the congregation. On the first Sunday of most months, we enjoy a "Rite 1" service. This means the syntax used is rather like Old English - somewhat Shakespearean in tone and content. We do this to recognize the past upon which our modern worship traditions are founded. We hope you enjoy both traditions and learn, with us, to savor the gift that is the Book of Common Prayer.

THIS MORNING'S MUSIC

This morning's music, for All Saints, is taken from several Christian communities across the world. Our Sanctus is from South Africa; our choral Hymn of Praise and Communion Hymn are derived from the Russian Orthodox liturgy; our Processional, Recessional, and Offertory hymns are very, very English, thank you very much; and the remaining hymns are American. Bringing them together into a thematic, musical, emotional whole wasn't easy, but I hope you find the effort worthwhile.

I'd like to bring particular attention today to "Remember your servants, Lord", our Communion hymn. The text is mostly taken from the Gospel lesson for today, the Beatitudes. It is surrounded with an antiphon, "Remember your servants, Lord, when you come into your kingly power." Both the text and the antiphon are ideally suited for today. The verses alternate between two tunes, both of which are easily learned, and from which the chanted text flows easily. The whole is hauntingly beautiful.

A few words about the Postlude from Grace Horner

Recueillement by twentieth century French composer, Noel-Gallon was introduced to me by the first organist I worked with at All Saints Episcopal Church in Pontiac, Michigan in the 1980's, where I came back into the Episcopal Church after a 17 and a half year hiatus.

The piece translates to "meditation" or "contemplation" which is quite appropriate for the celebration of All Saints and All Souls Days. It is quieter than postludes often are, but it is actually a little musical gem. Near the end of the piece, it calls for me to make use of the overtone series, such that I finger a G, but will actually sound the pitch a fifth higher. This allows me to play the higher pitch more softly than usual.

Please sit back and enjoy this sweet little piece as a nice close to our celebration of All Saints Day.

Lector: A reading from Revelation:

After this I, John, looked, and there was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, robed in white, with palm branches in their hands. They cried out in a loud voice, saying,

"Salvation belongs to our God who is seated on the throne, and to the Lamb!" And all the angels stood around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshiped God, singing,

"Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honor and power and might be to our God forever and ever! Amen."

Then one of the elders addressed me, saying, "Who are these, robed in white, and where have they come from?" I said to him, "Sir, you are the one that knows." Then he said to me, "These are they who have come out of the great ordeal; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb.

"For this reason they are before the throne of God, and worship him day and night within his temple, and the one who is seated on the throne will shelter them.

They will hunger no more, and thirst no more; the sun will not strike them, nor any scorching heat;

for the Lamb at the center of the throne will be their shepherd,

and he will guide them to springs of the water of life, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes."

The lector concludes the Old Testament.

Reader: The Word of the Lord. People: Thanks be to God.

Celebrant: The Candidates for Holy Baptism will now be presented by their parents, and by their respective godparents.

Parents and Godparents: I present Wynter Rose Shrimplin to receive the Sacrament of Baptism.

Parents and Godparents: I present Walker Reid Shrimplin to receive the Sacrament of Baptism.

Celebrant: Will you be responsible for seeing that the children you present are brought up in the Christian faith and life?

Parents and Godparents: I will, with God's help.

Celebrant: Will you by your prayers and witness help this child to grow into the full stature of Christ?

Parents and Godparents: I will, with God's help.

Then the Celebrant asks the following questions of the parents and godparents who speak on behalf of the children.

Question: Do you renounce Satan and all the spiritual forces of wickedness that rebel against God?

Answer: I renounce them.

Question: Do you renounce the evil powers of this world which corrupt and destroy the creatures of God?

Answer: I renounce them.

Question: Do you renounce all sinful desires that draw you

from the love of God?

Answer: I renounce them.

Question: Do you turn to Jesus Christ and accept him as your Savior?

Answer: I do.

Question: Do you put your whole trust in his grace and love?

Answer: I do.

Question: Do you promise to follow and obey him as your

Lord?

Answer: I do.

The Celebrant asks the congregation:

Celebrant: Will you who witness these vows do all in your power to support Wynter and Walker in their lives in Christ? **People: We will.**

Celebrant: Let us join with those who are committing themselves to Christ, and renew our own baptismal covenant.

The Baptismal Covenant

Celebrant: Do you believe in God the Father?

People: I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Celebrant: Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

People: I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord.

He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary.

He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried.

He descended to the dead.

On the third day he rose again.

He ascended into heaven,

and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

Celebrant: Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

People: I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.

Celebrant: Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers?

People: I will, with God's help.

Celebrant: Will you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord?

People: I will, with God's help.

Celebrant: Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ?

People: I will, with God's help.

Celebrant: Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving

your neighbor as yourself?

People: I will, with God's help.

Celebrant: Will you strive for justice and peace among all people,

and respect the dignity of every human being?

People: I will, with God's help.

Prayers for the Candidates

Celebrant: Let us now pray for these children who are to receive the Sacrament of new birth.

A Person appointed leads the following petitions:

Leader: Deliver them, O Lord, from the way of sin and

death.

People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: Open their hearts to your grace and truth.

People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: Fill them with your holy and life-giving Spirit.

People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: Keep them in the faith and communion of your holy

Church.

People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: Teach them to love others in the power of the Spirit.

People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: Send them into the world in witness to your love.

People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: Bring them to the fullness of your peace and

glory.

People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Celebrant: Grant, O Lord, that all who are baptized into the death of Jesus Christ your Son may live in the power of his resurrection and look for him to come again in glory; who lives and reigns now and forever. **Amen.**

Thanksgiving over the Water

The Celebrant pours the water into the font and blesses the water, first saying

Celebrant: The Lord be with you.

People: And also with you.

Celebrant: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People: It is right to give Him thanks and praise.

Celebrant: We thank you, Almighty God, for the gift of water. Over it the Holy Spirit moved in the beginning of creation. Through it you led the children of Israel out of their bondage in

Egypt into the land of promise. In it your Son Jesus received the baptism of John and was anointed by the Holy Spirit as the Messiah, the Christ, to lead us, through his death and resurrection, from the bondage of sin into everlasting life.

We thank you, Father, for the water of Baptism. In it we are buried with Christ in his death. By it we share in his resurrection. Through it we are reborn by the Holy Spirit. Therefore in joyful obedience to your Son, we bring into his fellowship those who come to him in faith, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

The Baptism

The candidate is presented by name to the Celebrant who says:

Celebrant: Wynter Rose Shrimplin, I baptize you in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

Celebrant: Walker Reid Shrimplin, I baptize you in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

Then the Celebrant says.

Celebrant: Let us pray.

Heavenly Father, we thank you that by water and the Holy Spirit you have bestowed upon these your servants the forgiveness of sin, and have raised them to the new life of grace. Sustain them, O Lord, in your Holy Spirit. Give them an inquiring and discerning heart, the courage to will and to persevere, a spirit to know and to love you, and the gift of joy and wonder in all your works. **Amen.**

The Celebrant places a hand on the person's head, marking on the forehead the sign of the cross.

Celebrant: Wynter, you are sealed by the Holy Spirit in Baptism and marked as Christ's own forever. **Amen.**

Celebrant: Walker, you are sealed by the Holy Spirit in Baptism and marked as Christ's own forever. **Amen.**

Celebrant: Wynter and Walker, receive these candles as a sign of the light of Christ that lives in you.

The candles are lit by one godparent for each of the children.

The Celebrant faces the congregation and continues:

Celebrant: Let us welcome the newly baptized.

Celebrant and People: We receive you into the household of God. Confess the faith of Christ crucified, proclaim his resurrection, and share with us in his eternal priesthood.




