

- St. Philip's Church is one of 127 congregations in the Episcopal Diocese of Chicago, and our identity, vision and mission extend far beyond through the worldwide Anglican Communion. # A Lenten Note on the Liturgy

During Lent, we will use the Old English form of the Holy Eucharist known as Rite I. This is the form we regularly use on the first Sunday of the month, so it is familiar to most parishioners. The Vestry's Worship Team felt this was an appropriate way to emphasize a change in the liturgical life of the parish during Lent. Both Rite I and Rite II have serious aspects of reminding us to "Repent & Believe" (St. Mark 1:14). The Rite I Mass has a slightly more penitential feel in its language. There are 5 Sundays in Lent, and we plan to use them wisely to bring us to a full celebration of the Paschal Mystery during Holy Week and Easter.

Your feedback to the Vestry is welcome and desired.

#### THIS MORNING'S MUSIC

This morning's music focuses on obedience in our pilgrimage through Lent and through life. For our relationship with God is a covenant relationship, a covenant sealed in Jesus' passion and resurrection. No longer must we bring burnt offerings, but we do need to follow Jesus. Sometimes that faithfulness comes with a high cost, but we are called to follow nevertheless.

Finally, The Hymnal 1982 includes part of our closing hymn as H-635. Unlike the ELW version, H-635 contains only two of the original four verses. The decision to use only two verses predates much ecumenical work related to grace and justification between the leaderships of Lutheran, Roman Catholic, Anglican, Methodist, and Reformed denominations. But a book's publication is a point in time, and, just as expressions of faith in word and music continue, the work of reconciling the Church universal continues. Perhaps if The Hymnal 1982's decision were to be revisited today, all four verses would be included.

in thought, word, and deed,
by what we have done,
and by what we have left undone.
We have not loved thee with our whole heart;

have mercy on us and forgive us;
that we may delight in thy will,

First Reading

Genesis 17:1-7, 15-16

**Lector:** A reading from the book of <u>Genesis</u>:

When Abram was ninety-nine years old, the Lord appeared to Abram, and said to him, "I am God Almighty; walk before me, and be blameless. And I will make my covenant between me and you, and will make you exceedingly numerous." Then Abram fell on his face; and God said to him, "As for me, this is my covenant with you: You shall be the ancestor of a multitude of nations. No longer shall your name be Abram, but your name shall be Abraham; for I have made you the ancestor of a multitude of nations. I will make you exceedingly fruitful; and I will make nations of you, and kings shall come from you. I will establish my covenant between me and you, and your offspring after you throughout their generations, for an everlasting covenant, to be God to you and to your offspring after you.

God said to Abraham, "As for Sarai your wife, you shall not call her Sarai, but Sarah shall be her name. I will bless her, and moreover I will give you a son by her. I will bless her, and she shall give rise to nations; kings of peoples shall come from her."

Reader: The Word of the Lord. People: Thanks be to God.

#### **Psalm**

Lector: Let us chant together the words of Psalm 22:22-30.

*Note on chanting:* 

Because our psalm today has an odd number of verses:

- ► We'll use the first half of the psalm tone for verses 22, 24, 26, and 28.
- *>We'll use the second half for verses 23, 25, 27, 29, and 30.*

Please note that we'll sing the second half twice in a row at the end of the psalm.

#### **Second Reading**

Romans 4:13-25

**Vested Lector:** A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans.

For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.

For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations") —in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become "the father of many nations," according to what was said, "So numerous shall your descendants be." He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. Therefore his faith "was reckoned to him as righteousness." Now the words, "it was reckoned to him," were written not for his sake alone, but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.

Reader: The Word of the Lord. People: Thanks be to God.

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to <u>Mark</u>: **People**: Glory be to Thee, O Lord.

Jesus began to teach his disciples that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, "Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things." He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels."

### The Nicene Creed

Spoken by all, please stand as you are able.

I believe in one God, the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, and of all things visible and invisible;

And in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only-begotten Son of God, begotten of his Father before all worlds, God of God, Light of Light, very God of very God, begotten, not made, being of one substance with the Father; by whom all things were made: who for us men and for our salvation came down from heaven. and was incarnate by the Holy Ghost of the Virgin Mary, and was made man: and was crucified also for us under Pontius Pilate; he suffered and was buried: and the third day he rose again according to the Scriptures, and ascended into heaven. and sitteth on the right hand of the Father; and he shall come again, with glory, to judge both the quick and the dead; whose kingdom shall have no end.

Let us pray for our own needs and those of others. (Additional prayers are offered for our parishioners, community, and world.)
We pray for all requests in our Book of Intentions.

The Priest adds a concluding collect...

Priest: O Lord our God, accept the fervent prayers of thy people; in the multitude of thy mercies, look with compassion upon us and all who turn unto thee for help; for thou art gracious, O lover of souls, and to thee we give glory, Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, now and forever. **Amen**.

### The Peace

Priest: The peace of the Lord be always with you.

People: And with thy spirit.

After the confession, which reconciles us with God and our neighbors, we exchange the peace with a handshake or hug, and the words, "**Peace be with you**". This comes from the Jewish practice that required the people to be reconciled with one another before offering a gift at the altar. The Peace ends the Liturgy of the Word and we begin the Liturgy of the Table, which is the Eucharist.



Please kneel or stand as you are able. The priest continues:

Priest: All glory be to thee, Almighty God, our heavenly Father, for that thou, of thy tender mercy, didst give thine only Son Jesus Christ to suffer death upon the cross for our redemption; who made there, by his one oblation of himself once offered, a full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction, for the sins of the whole world; and did institute, and in his holy Gospel command us to continue, a perpetual memory of that his precious death and sacrifice, until his coming again.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Priest is to hold it, or lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

The priest continues:

For in the night in which he was betrayed, he took bread; and when he had given thanks, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take, eat, this is my Body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

The Acolyte rings the bell.

Likewise, after supper, he took the cup; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, "Drink ye all of this; for this is my Blood of the New Testament, which is shed for you, and for many, for the remission of sins. Do this, as oft as ye shall drink it, in remembrance of me."

The Acolyte rings the bell.

Wherefore, O Lord and heavenly Father, according to the institution of thy dearly beloved Son our Savior Jesus Christ, we, thy humble servants, do celebrate and make here before thy divine Majesty, with these thy holy gifts, which we now offer unto thee, the memorial thy Son hath commanded us to make; having in remembrance his blessed passion and precious death, his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension; rendering unto thee most hearty thanks for the innumerable benefits procured unto us by the same.

And we most humbly beseech thee, O merciful Father, to hear us; and, of thy almighty goodness, vouchsafe to bless and sanctify, with thy Word and Holy Spirit, these thy gifts and creatures of bread and wine; that we, receiving them according to thy Son our Savior Jesus Christ's holy institution, in remembrance of his death and passion, may be partakers of his most blessed Body and Blood.

And we earnestly desire thy fatherly goodness mercifully to accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving; most humbly beseeching thee to grant that, by the merits and death of thy Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in his blood, we, and all thy whole Church, may obtain remission of our sins, and all other benefits of his passion.

And here we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, our selves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice unto thee; humbly beseeching thee that we, and all others who shall be partakers of this Holy Communion, may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of thy Son Jesus Christ, be filled with thy grace and heavenly benediction, and made one body with him, that he may dwell in us, and we in him.

And although we are unworthy, through our manifold sins, to offer unto thee any sacrifice, yet we beseech thee to accept this our bounden duty and service, not weighing our merits, but pardoning our offenses, through Jesus Christ our Lord; By whom, and with whom, in the unity of the Holy Ghost, all honor and glory be unto thee, O Father Almighty, world without end.

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
# The Breaking of the Bread
