A Lenten Note on the Liturgy

During Lent, we will use the Old English form of the Holy Eucharist known as Rite I. This is the form we regularly use on the first Sunday of the month, so it is familiar to most parishioners. The Vestry's Worship Team felt this was an appropriate way to emphasize a change in the liturgical life of the parish during Lent. Both Rite I and Rite II have serious aspects of reminding us to "Repent & Believe" (St. Mark 1:14). The Rite I Mass has a slightly more penitential feel in its language. There are 5 Sundays in Lent, and we plan to use them wisely to bring us to a full celebration of the Paschal Mystery during Holy Week and Easter.

Your feedback to the Vestry is welcome and desired.

THIS MORNING'S MUSIC

Today, I'm in Dublin, and Julie Ballenger is kind enough to substitute for me. I'll be back next Sunday.

This morning, I'd like to draw your attention to the hymn tune Wondrous Love. It's an American folk tune that was recorded in a book called The Southern Harmony and published in 1835. The Southern Harmony, along with The Sacred Harp and others, are books that were used by American singing schools during our colonial period. Instead of today's musical notation, which almost exclusively uses ovals to depict pitches and note durations on musical staffs, the shape note approach used ovals, squares, and triangles on staffs. The American singing school tradition, using shape note books, lasted longest in the South, hence the name of the collection, The Southern Harmony.

As a piece of music, Wondrous Love is both economical and very expressive. It uses 9 melodic notes, from middle C to the second D above that. It has only 4 simple chords – you could accompany this on an autoharp or a hammered dulcimer and it would still be effective. It's the music of a small church in a hollow, somewhere in the Appalachians.

Then, compare Wondrous Love with Herzliebster Jesu, the tune for our closing hymn. Johann Cruger's music for Herzliebster Jesu is moody, introspective, pensive, and plaintive. He uses 12 chords; his careful use of that variety creates the hymn's affect. This is music designed for an somewhat trained, unaccompanied, choir or for voices accompanied by organ. It's the music of a northern German town's main stone church.

And we're blessed to have both.

Silence may be kept.



But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the Lord: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, "Know the Lord," for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the Lord; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

Reader: The Word of the Lord. People: Thanks be to God.

Vested Lector: A reading from the letter of St. Paul to the Hebrews.

Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him,

"You are my Son, today I have begotten you"; as he says also in another place,

"You are a priest forever,
according to the order of Melchizedek."

In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

Reader: The Word of the Lord. People: Thanks be to God.

The Gospel

John 12:20-33

Priest:

The Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to St. John: **People:** Glory be to Thee, O Lord.

Now among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, "Sir, we wish to see Jesus." Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. Jesus answered them, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honor.

"Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say—'Father, save me from this hour'? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name." Then a voice came from heaven, "I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again." The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. Others said, "An angel has spoken to him." Jesus answered, "This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. Now is the judgment of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself." He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die.

Spoken by all, please stand as you are able.

And in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only-begotten Son of God, begotten of his Father before all worlds, God of God, Light of Light, very God of very God, begotten, not made, being of one substance with the Father; by whom all things were made: who for us men and for our salvation came down from heaven. and was incarnate by the Holy Ghost of the Virgin Mary, and was made man: and was crucified also for us under Pontius Pilate; he suffered and was buried: and the third day he rose again according to the Scriptures, and ascended into heaven. and sitteth on the right hand of the Father; and he shall come again, with glory, to judge both the quick and the dead; whose kingdom shall have no end.

And I believe in the Holy Ghost the Lord, and Giver of Life, who proceedeth from the Father and the Son; who with the Father and the Son together is worshiped and glorified; who spake by the Prophets.

And I believe one holy Catholic and Apostolic Church; I acknowledge one Baptism for the remission of sins; and I look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Priest: O Lord our God, accept the fervent prayers of thy people; in the multitude of thy mercies, look with compassion upon us and all who turn unto thee for help; for thou art gracious, O lover of souls, and to thee we give glory, Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, now and forever. **Amen**.

The Peace

Priest: The peace of the Lord be always with you.

People: And with thy spirit.

After the confession, which reconciles us with God and our neighbors, we exchange the peace with a handshake or hug, and the words, "Peace be with you". This comes from the Jewish practice that required the people to be reconciled with one another before offering a gift at the altar. The Peace ends the Liturgy of the Word and we begin the Liturgy of the Table, which is the Eucharist.





Please kneel or stand as you are able. The priest continues:

Priest: All glory be to thee, Almighty God, our heavenly Father, for that thou, of thy tender mercy, didst give thine only Son Jesus Christ to suffer death upon the cross for our redemption; who made there, by his one oblation of himself once offered, a full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction, for the sins of the whole world; and did institute, and in his holy Gospel command us to continue, a perpetual memory of that his precious death and sacrifice, until his coming again.

The Acolyte rings the bell.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Priest is to hold it, or lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

The priest continues:

For in the night in which he was betrayed, he took bread; and when he had given thanks, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take, eat, this is my Body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

The Acolyte rings the bell.

Likewise, after supper, he took the cup; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, "Drink ye all of this; for this is my Blood of the New Testament, which is shed for you, and for many, for the remission of sins. Do this, as oft as ye shall drink it, in remembrance of me."

The Acolyte rings the bell.

Wherefore, O Lord and heavenly Father, according to the institution of thy dearly beloved Son our Savior Jesus Christ, we, thy humble servants, do celebrate and make here before thy divine Majesty, with these thy holy gifts, which we now offer unto thee, the memorial thy Son hath commanded us to make; having in remembrance his blessed passion and precious death, his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension; rendering unto thee most hearty thanks for the innumerable benefits procured unto us by the same.

And we most humbly beseech thee, O merciful Father, to hear us; and, of thy almighty goodness, vouchsafe to bless and sanctify, with thy Word and Holy Spirit, these thy gifts and creatures of bread and wine; that we, receiving them according to thy Son our Savior Jesus Christ's holy institution, in remembrance of his death and passion, may be partakers of his most blessed Body and Blood.

And we earnestly desire thy fatherly goodness mercifully to accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving; most humbly beseeching thee to grant that, by the merits and death of thy Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in his blood, we, and all thy whole Church, may obtain remission of our sins, and all other benefits of his passion.

And here we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, our selves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice unto thee; humbly beseeching thee that we, and all others who shall be partakers of this Holy Communion, may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of thy Son Jesus Christ, be filled with thy grace and heavenly \maltese benediction, and made one body with him, that he may dwell in us, and we in him.




The Breaking of the Bread
