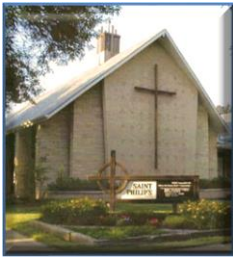

Hi friends!

I thought I'd share summer reading recommendations. Some I've read; some I'm currently reading; others have been suggested by folks who've tipped me off to good reads before. Enjoy...

1. *Educated: A Memoir*, by Tara Westover (Caution: this book is for adults. It is a fascinating look into the world of hyper-fundamentalism. As such, there are descriptions of abuse that are troubling. Not for everyone. I found it hard to put down though. Not least because it establishes a substantive link between extremist religion and anti-intellectualism.)
2. *On the Incarnation*, by St. Athanasius (I often recommend reading this during Advent and Christmas. But it's awe-inspiring anytime.)
3. *Between Noon and Three: Romance, Law & the Outrage of Grace*, by Robert Farrar Capon (It's next on my 'to read' list! If it's half as good as his book on the parables of Jesus, it's well worth the time. Capon is a master.)



4. *Revelations of Divine Love*, by Julian of Norwich (I quote her often in my sermons.)
5. *In Defense of Elitism*, by Joel Stein (The Time Magazine humorist writes with a verve and playfulness that is appealing. Just when you think he's an arrogant boor, he pokes fun at himself for his arrogantly boorish tendencies. Stein makes a compelling case for valuing expertise.)
6. *Jesus Calling*, by Sarah Young (Ginger Knowles read vestry a number of selections from these meditations. They are brief, but very inspiring!)
7. *The Killer Angels*, by Michael Shaara (A Pulitzer nominee and classic about the Battle of Gettysburg. Hard to put down.)
8. *When Your World Falls Apart*, by David Jeremiah (He's authored many books I would not recommend, but this one was both helpful and inspiring.)
9. *The Dalai Lama: An Extraordinary Life*, by Alexander Norman (Highly recommended to me by - of all people - a Baptist pastor!)
10. *With Christ in the School of Prayer*, by Andrew Murray (A 19th century gem that can revitalize a disciple's prayer life.)

If you pick up one or two of these over the summer, let's chat! If you have recommendations of your own, please pass them along.

**What is going on at the Chicago Diocese?
What are the next steps?**

Obviously, the Coronavirus has disrupted our lives, our society, and our Church. Our Churches have been closed. Bishop Lee has postponed his retirement. The June convention to elect a new Bishop has been canceled.

The current thinking is to elect a new Bishop at the annual convention in November and hold that convention on Zoom or its equivalent. The Bishop and the Diocese are busy planning the way to reopen our Churches. Here are some guidelines they will consider. These are part of work presented by Rev. Ellen Ekevag on Leadership During Trauma.

Promote Safety

Create and present simple and clear guidelines for each phase of re-entry. Guidelines for the purpose of keeping each other safe and doing it together.

Promote Calm

Embrace simplicity. Lean into our rich traditions of prayer and worship. Encourage people to develop personal prayer practices. Provide times when people can express themselves and their feelings.

Promote Self and Collective Efficacy

Efficacy is the ability to successfully get the job done. The ability to produce the desired result. For example, by communicating unity of purpose

Promote Connectedness

Be always humble, gentle, and patient. Show your love by being tolerant with one another. Do your best to preserve the unity which the Spirit gives by means of the peace that binds you together (Ephesians 4:2-3)

Promote Hope

Reinforce our church's values. Clearly articulate hope as a value. Pursue achievable goals. Make meaning of the current moment.



GREETERS

“Let mutual love continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it.” **(Hebrews 13: 1)**

When Keith and I came to St. Philip’s, the first greeting we received was from Andy Obara. We remember that well because he welcomed us with a smile and hug, which touched our hearts. When seated in the pew, Father Jim approached us and introduced himself, which impressed us, as this has never happened to us at any other church we have attended. Not only that, but Father Jim remembered our names as we received Communion. These gestures, as small as they may seem to others, meant a great deal to us, as we felt as though we were not just numbers, but actually welcomed to the congregation.

Being a Greeter has responsibilities:

- Greeters are the personification, the representative, the exemplar, that is, the church embodied. Their very presence is the first living impression of the church body.
- Greeters need to realize they are more than themselves. They are the style and spirit of the church in human form.
- Greeters are the Ambassadors of the Door. They are the gatekeepers in the House of the Lord; the envoy of the Lord of the House.^[1]
